Greetings distinguished Chair,

IHRAAM thanks Ms. E. Tendayi Achiume (Zambia) for acknowledging that apartheid and doctrines of superiority still exist in today's world².

Double standards and the blatantly xenophobic racist application of law and policy against Indigenous Peoples must be designated its own brand of racism in Government. The United Nations instituted this brand of racism by adopting General Assembly resolution 1469 on 12 December 1959, removing Alaska and Hawaii as Non-Self-Governing Territories. Alaska Indigenous Peoples are treated as strangers in their own territories by denying its right of self-determination on grounds of racial discrimination. The US Supreme Court held that the land in Alaska is for the settlement of the white race³ and that we must adhere to the ascendancy of the European civilization⁴. The Johnson v. McIntosh precedence is instituted in Canada⁵ and throughout North America and the West.

Madame Special Rapporteur,

this racist xenophobia in Government is the “rule of law” accepted by the European Union, the United Kingdom, Australia and New Zealand and by other United Nations States.

Please, call upon the Human Rights Council and the General Assembly to address the institutionalized racism in the United Nations system.
